OPHS is proud to be a no-kill shelter, never euthanizing for space. As with years past, the number of pets in 2022 who suffered from irreparable medical or behavioral issues that compromised their quality of life was very low and equated to less than 2%, or a 98% save rate!

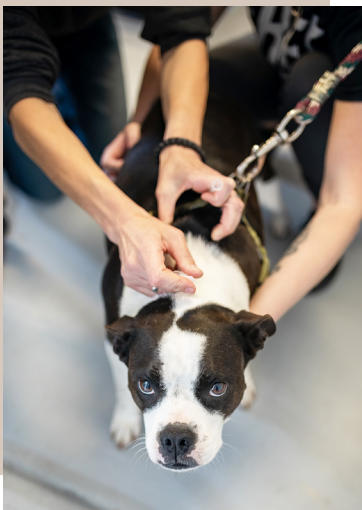
57 Cats/Kittens placed in Foster Homes

The number of Foster families increased by 83% over 2021. And, the number of animals adopted from Foster Homes increased by 77.6%. That equates to 125 animals that didn't do well in the shelter environment and had a better chance to be placed in a loving forever-home.

Volunteer Hours for 2022

2022 saw the return of volunteers who help walk our dogs, socialize our cats and help clean, do laundry, stuff envelopes and a host of other duties. Their help equates to \$59,900 in savings for OPHS.

Microchip Clinic

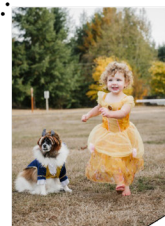
Meowgaritas and Mutts

Spay/Neuter Clinics On the Horizon

Currently there is a huge backlog of animals needing spay/neutering in Clallam County. With the addition of the new surgery suite on the Kitty City campus, OPHS plans to provide spay/neuter assistance clinics beginning in March of 2023.

New Office and Respite at Bark House Campus

The 2022 Fund-a-Need held at the annual gala helped to fund a portion of a planned respite house for dogs needing a reprieve from the kennel environment. County requirements dictate changes to the aging mobile coaches that currently serve as office space. Targeted completion date, August 2024.

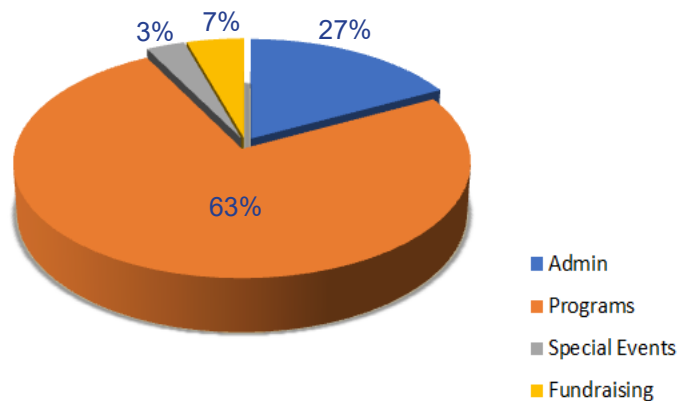
